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A successful flycatcher hatchling in the Veuve Reserve

The Veuve Reserve is delighted to announce the successful fledging of a Paradise flycatcher chick. The Seychelles Black Paradise Flycatcher (*Tersiphone corvina*) is a rare and endemic species to Seychelles. The nest was first spotted on the 24th May 2013 on a 'Porse' tree (*Cordia subcordata*). Daily nest monitoring was conducted to monitor the progress and activity of the birds in the nest. Both male and female were very active in the nest and the chick hatched on the 12th June.

The new chick was ringed on 28th June by SNPA staffs and it will be a while until we can ascertain whether it is male or female as the chick always has the mothers' colouring. This is a great success for Veuve Reserve and the conservation programme of this species.

The Seychelles Paradise Flycatcher are classified as critically endangered by the International Union for Conservation of Nature (IUCN)



A turtle Festival for Seychelles

Seychelles first Turtle Festival was held on the Friday 9th and Saturday 10th of August 2013. The festival was brought about through an initiative of Global Vision International (GVI) and Marine Conservation Society of Seychelles, with the collaboration of key partners such as the Seychelles National Parks Authority, Ministry of Environment, Ministry of education – Eko School, Save our Seas Foundation, Four Seasons Resort and Wise Ocean, among others.

As part of the Festival, earlier in the year, an artwork, poetry and logo competition were launched in all schools, at both primary and secondary levels. Winners were awarded at the official opening of the festival, on the 9th August. Presentations were given as part of the opening ceremony and one of the guest speakers was SNPAs own Assistant Research Officer, Ms. Gilberte Gendron, who gave a short presentation on the laws protecting sea turtles.

The festival ended on Saturday with a film show which screened "The Incredible Journey", an animated movie targeting school kids and their parents. In the afternoon various activities were organized on Beau Vallon beach, and these included face painting, guizzes, snorkeling and sale of food items, among others.

This activity was an initiative to raise awareness on the plight of sea turtles and how each individual can play their role to ensure protection of these endangered species.

The exhibition attracted mostly secondary school students all over Mahe, mainly S3-S5 student who are in the process of making career choices. There was a lot of enthusiasm from students and a large number showed interested in following a career in the maritime sector.

'Outsiders' tree planting project in the Veuve Reserve

Tree planting is one of the activities that Outsiders Volleyball Sport Club players undertake in the Veuve Reserve every year, during their annual visit on La Digue Island. The aim of their activity is to demonstrate their contribution towards a deeper commitment to environment conservation, through planting of new trees.

This Tree Planting project was started back in 2009 and it is an annual event. It's now been 5 years, and these volleyball players have planted over 500 trees in the Veuve Reserve. So far the project has been very successful; the players have lots of fun carrying out the planting activities and are always looking forward to coming back the following year.

This years' tree planting took place on 13th July 2013, alongside the 'La Mare Soupape' Wetland, and a total of 89 trees were planted. Some of the trees planted were Takamaka, Badamier, Bonnen kare, Bwa torti, Bwa sousouri and some coconut trees. At the same time they learned about the importance of the forest environment for the ENDEMIC Seychelles Paradise Flycatcher.

Turtle festival Family Fun Day

As part of the first edition of the turtle festival, a family fun day was organised at Beau Vallon beach. The rendezvous was announced for noon, however, by ten in the morning the organisers and participating organisations were setting up their stalls, displays, artworks, educational materials, to name a few.

The National Parks Authority staffs joined up with Global Vision International to set up a stall which was offering painting activities, quiz and for the education enthusiasts; the reproduction of turtle tracks in various circumstances such as emergence stopped by obstacles, poaching, and even a turtle laying. In addition turtle monitoring equipments were on display which enabled the general public to learn how the emergence is recorded, how to identify the turtle species, how to tag a turtle and how to measure tracks and turtles.

Walking down the promenade, one could purchase turtle shaped cupcakes from Four Season hotel stand or Academy by the sea stall, then walk around to appreciate the informative displays and presentations about sea turtles prepared by various organisations such as Marine Conservation Society Seychelles, Darros Research Centre / Save our Seas foundation, Seychelles Island Foundation, Ministry of Environment and Energy and others. The afternoon ended with kids participating in a sand castle competition.

Experience of students on work attachment with SNPA

Sixteen-year-old Derrick Cupidon is in Secondary 5 at Belonie secondary school. Since Secondary 4 he has opted for

the Technical Vocational Education Training (TIVET) program, whereby he had the chance to join the Maritime Training Center (MTC). He would like to work at sea, and this is one of the reasons why during his second year on the program he chose Seychelles National Parks Authority (SNPA) as the organisation where he would do his placement. Heron Morel is also sixteen-year-old and in Secondary 5 at Anse Royale secondary school. He is following the same program as Derrick. Heron is planning to further his studies at the MTC upon completion of his secondary



schooling, as he would like to become a professional diver.

They both had the opportunity to join the Operation Section of the SNPA. They were attached to the section from January till September this year. They attended school on Mondays and Tuesdays to undertake academic classes such as English, French and Mathematics. The rest of the week they assumed duty at SNPA as the vocational part of their course, whereby they joined the staff to get hands on practice.

During the attachment Derrick and Heron were assigned different tasks so as to broaden their knowledge and skills. This included assisting rangers in the field to conduct patrol in the marine parks; retrieving fish trap within the parks boundary, navigation and also selling tickets to boat charters at both Cap Ternay and Ste Anne. On other occasion they lent a hand in maintenance work such as boat repair and painting. They learned a bit of mechanic on boat engines; as well as chainsaws from the forestry section. Derrick got to perfect his splicing skills learnt at MTC and they also were taught how to tie knots like bowline, while assisting in setting up mooring buoys.

Additional to their daily routine, Derrick and Heron got to participate in a trip to Recif Island with the University of Seychelles students. On a few occasions they also got to help out the Forestry section to paint the forestry office at Sans Soucis and kiosk on the trail, undertook maintenance of the boardwalk at Vacoas trail, Barbarons, and also participated in tree cutting.

They are currently working at the Seychelles Coast Guard till the end of the year. However, both students stated that their work at SNPA has been a very rewarding and enriching experience, one they will not forget, especially the raft race organised by GVI which Derricks team won. Derrick also added that he would like to work at SNPA after he has completed his studies at MTC.
